What are Students Aiming for?

- ☐ National performance will be measured on Progress 8 (GCSE or approved qualifications) including English & Maths, providing a broad and balanced education in line with our curriculum intent.
- ☐ To access a programme of three A-level/Level 3 courses in Year 12, students will need to gain a minimum of 33 points from their 7 best GCSE results including English and Maths at grade 4 or above.
- ☐ English (Language & Literature)
- ☐ Maths
- ☐ Combined/Triple Science
- ☐ Religious Studies GCSE
- ☐ A Modern Foreign Language
- ☐ Personal, Health & Social Education
- ☐ Physical Education
- ☐ Plus 2 further option subjects



Assessment

- ☐ Examinations at the end of the course
- ☐ No re-sits during the course
- ☐ Retakes only possible in Maths and English in November following the Summer GCSEs
- ☐ All subjects using performance rating of 9 to 1
- ☐ Specific marks for spelling, punctuation and grammar
- ☐ Some courses have Non-Examination Assessment or Controlled Assessment

- ☐ From 0%– 60% of the final marks

- ❑ The 1 to 9 scale is not an exact conversion from old GCSE grades A* to G
- ❑ A Grade 4 is considered to be a standard pass with a Grade 5 being a good pass

❑ 33 points across their 7 best GCSE results

❑ This equates to an average of grade 5 (5 grade 5's and 2 grade 4's would give 33 points)

❑ This will be required for a programme of three A Level or Level 3 courses in Year 12



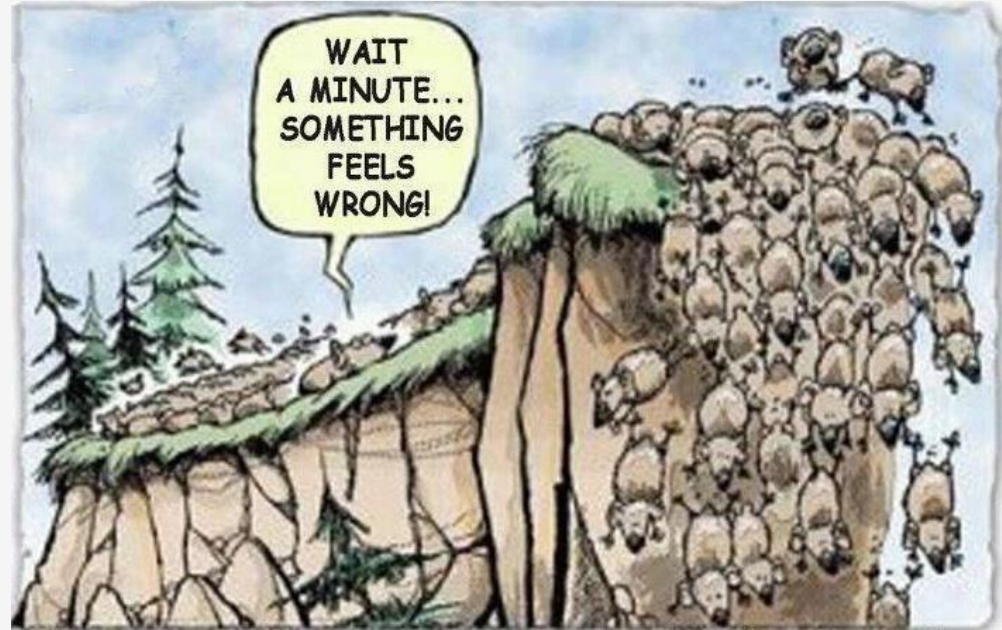
Students **SHOULD** Choose a Course...

- ☐ They are good at it and think they will enjoy the subject
- ☐ It links to a career idea
- ☐ It will go well with their other choices
- ☐ It will help them develop knowledge and skills that interest them
- ☐ They think that they might want to continue studying it after Year 11
- ☐ Their research shows that it will interest and motivate them



Students **SHOULD NOT** Choose a Course...

- ☐ Their friends have chosen it
- ☐ Someone else thinks it's a good idea
- ☐ They like the teacher they have now
- ☐ It sounds good (but they don't know much about it)



Pathways

There are 4 Curriculum Pathways

Students will be allocated a pathway in the next few weeks based on prior attainment and application at KS3.

K – Accelerated Pathway

E – Core Pathway 1

V – Core Pathway 2

I – Core Pathway 3

Students on the Accelerated Pathway have increased time for studying single Sciences and a slight reduction in the time for English, Maths and RS.

Languages are compulsory

Languages are chosen in Year 8

Dual linguists can choose to continue with two languages:

- ☐ GCSE French (Level 2)
- ☐ GCSE German (Level 2)



Science

Pathway K: Triple Science (AQA)

- ❑ 3 GCSE's in Physics, Chemistry & Biology
- ❑ 2 Exam papers in each discipline

Pathway E,V & I : Combined Science (AQA)

- ❑ 2 GCSE's in Combined Science
- ❑ 6 papers in total and the format is as the triple only the content is slimmed down

Both Triple and Combined Science can lead to A Level Biology, Chemistry, Physics or Medical Science



Religious Studies

All students complete the full GCSE course for RS

- ❑ GCSE Religious Studies, Philosophy and Applied Ethics
- ❑ *Those on the accelerated pathway K will cover the content over 3 lessons a fortnight, those on the other pathways over 4 lessons a fortnight*

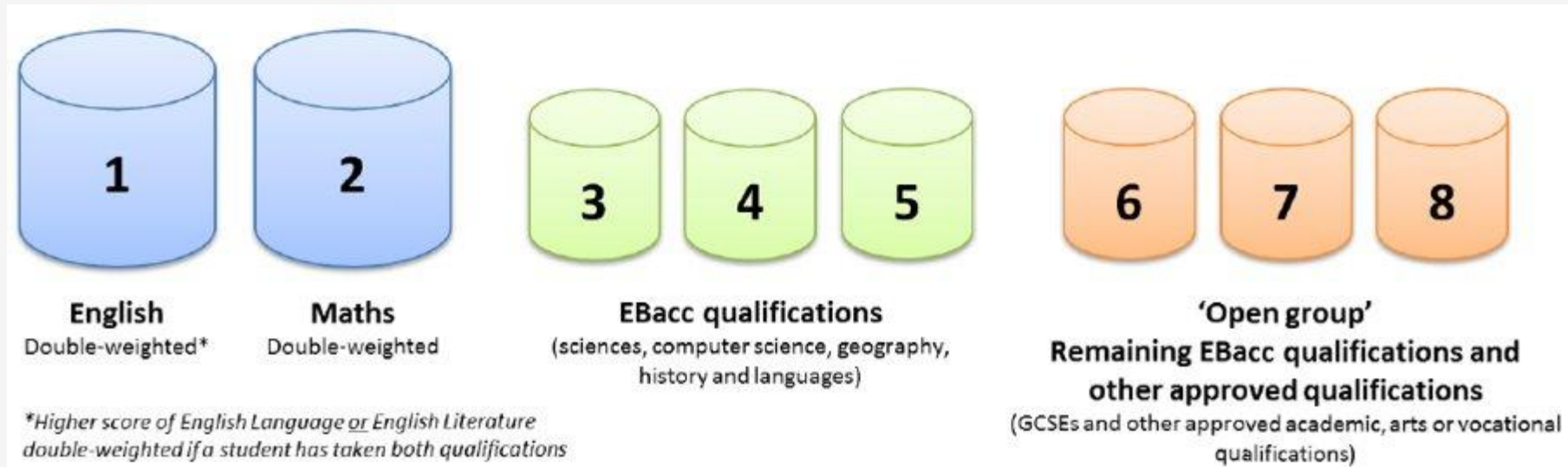
English Baccalaureate

- ☐ Not an overarching qualification
- ☐ Does not currently lead to a certificate
- ☐ Students need to obtain GCSE 9 - 5 passes in:
 - ☐ English (and be entered for English Literature)
 - ☐ Mathematics
 - ☐ Two Sciences
 - ☐ History or Geography
 - ☐ A Modern Foreign Language

Progress 8 is a measure of school performance:



The floor standard for schools is based on schools' results for the Progress 8 measure.



Age of Participation

The Education and Skills Act 2008 means that students must continue in education or training until their 18th birthday.

Following on from compulsory education up to age of 16. Young people will be able to choose one of the following:

- ☐ Full-time education, such as school, college or home education work-based learning, such as an Apprenticeship
- ☐ Part-time education or training if they are employed, self-employed or volunteering for more than 20 hours a week



What is the Process?

- ☐ Complete preferences online by Monday 3rd March 2025
- ☐ The option blocks will be drawn up in response to their choices
- ☐ Consultation with students and parents
- ☐ Any changes to preferences confirmed in writing
- ☐ June 2025 – Final groups lists created

We recommend they get their choices right first time.

There will be no changes in September.
